AAUP ACTIVITIES

STUDENT WELFARE

1. AAUP Studentships

Under this program this year studentships were disbursed among 45 needy students in different faculties of the University. Out of these, 25 were financed by the Colombo Chapter and 14 are from perpetual awards using permenat grants established over the past period. During the current year, the following funds were added to the Needy Students' Fund.

The Sri Lanka Women's Association (Belgium) has donated Rs. 125,000 to establish four permanent AAUP studentships. Mr. Mahinda Senanayake (AAUP Executive committee member) was instrumental in organising this donation.

Mrs. Patrecia Jayatilleka has donated a sum of Rs. 100,000 for the establishment of the *Prof. K.N. Jayatilleka Memorial Medical Assistance Fund*, under the AAUP Needy Students Fund.

Dr. P. Ramanujam has donated Rs. 30,000.00 to establish the *Mr. D. Ramanujam Studentship* to be awarded to the child of an estate worker. Dr. A.S. Abeyratne (AAUP Executive Committee member) co-ordinated this donation.

Dr. B. Sirisena, Executive Committee Member of the AAUP donated Rs. 30,000/= for the *Mrs. Francis W. Wiesenfeld Studentship*. This studentship will be granted to a visually disabled student at the University of Peradeniya. The studentship was established by Dr. Sirisena to honour the dedicated services of Mrs. Francis W. Wiesenfeld to the visually impaired in Sri

Lanka. As a teacher in the Integrated Education of Visually Handicapped Children Project sponsored by UNICEF and AFOS (American Foundation for the Overseas Blind) she created an environment which made it possible for the visually disabled to participate in all aspects of Sri Lankan society. She worked devotedly to integrate visually handicapped children with normal children, to make it possible for such persons to participate in all aspects of Sri Lankan society, and to make them assets rather than liabilities to their communities. Wiesenfeld loves Sri Lanka, visits the country frequently and continues to help the visually impaired and their families as a host parent.

Peradeniya Chemistry Alumni in the United States has donated an further sum of Rs. 55,493.75 to the *Peradeniya Chemistry Graduates' Studentship Fund* which had been established sometime ago.

A perpetual studentship may be set up by a well wisher in memory of a loved one of the donor by donating a minimum sum of Rs. 30,000. The interest obtained from the deposit of this money will utilised for the purpose specified by the donor through the Needy Students' Fund. It is also possible to give an award for the on going year by donating Rs. 3,000, which will be disbursed straight away. The NSF fund has been granted Approved Charity Status by the Treasury. Donors will be entitled to get the tax exemptions accordingly.

While thanking the donors and facilitators/coordinators of the studentships presently available, the AAUP would like to invite members, graduates and well wishers to contribute to the NSF even in a small way.

2. Seminar on Career Guidance

A Seminar on Career Guidance organised by the AAUP (Colombo Chapter) was held on July 3, 1999 at the E.O.E. Pereira Theatre at the Faculty of Engineering. About 450 students, mainly from the Faculties of Arts and Science participated. Prof. B.R.N. Mendis, Director, Career Guidance Unit of the University of Peradeniya, was the Chief Guest. Presentations were made by Mr. T. Thilakasiri, Management Consultant, SLIDA, Mr. Jayantha Jayaratne, Asst. General Manager, Commercial Bank and Mr. D.L. Kumaradasa, Ministry of Samurdhi, Youth Affairs and Sports. The speakers emphasised the fact that 80% of job opportunities are in the private sector and that although jobs are available, qualified personnel are difficult to find. Practical experience and skills outside the subjects offered for the degree were necessary prerequisites in the present job market. The job market now requires skills in communication and data processing as well as a positive attitude. The undergraduates were advised not to think that the Government and Society in general must provide each graduate with a job. It was up to the undergrads to make themselves employable. Mr. Kumaradasa offered practical and very useful advice on the preparation of a c.v. and facing an interview.

A Career Guidance Clinic was held during the afternoon session. This novel concept generated a great deal of interest as the undergraduates' moved from one Clinic to another. Resource Persons at the Clinic included Mr. Lalith Athukorale (Bodyline Pvt. Ltd.) Mr. Dian Gunatilleke (John Keells Holdings), Mr. Sarath Jayasuriya (Informatics Group of Companies), Mr. A.G. Mendis (Hayley's Group of Companies), Mr. Palitha Munasinghe (Bank of Ceylon), Mr. Sarath Rajapakse (Ministry of Vocational Training & Rural Industries) and Mr. D.M.P. Sooriyabanadara (DFCC), all of whom expended a great deal of energy in talking to several different groups of students. One resource person expressed the view that the Peradeniya undergrads were unprepared to seek a job and that there was a lack of awareness about employment prospects. There is no doubt that Seminars of this nature are essential and that undergraduates should

be made aware of employer expectations from the first year of entry to the University. The Seminar was sponsored by Commercial Bank, National Development Bank, Central Finance and Bank of Ceylon.

- 1. Seminar on Education:
- Vision for the next Millennium.

The Alumni Association University of Peradeniya (AAUP) conducted a Seminar, Education: Vision for the next Millennium, for GCE O/L students from the Kandy district. The Seminar highlighted the need to change the approach to education at school level in order to prepare teachers and students alike, to meet the changes in business, economic, social and professional environments required to meet the challenges of the next Millennium. The aim of the Seminar was to convey a message to teachers and parents as well as students, who have not yet decided on a future career, about the variety of options available in the current job market.

Resource persons who participated in the Seminar included Mr. Lalith Welamedage (Chamber of Commerce), Mr. Wijaya Wickramaratne (President's Counsel), Mr. A.M. Gunaratne (Deputy Surveyor General)_ Mr. Senaka Wijewardene (Hotel School), Mr. R.B. Herath (Chartered Architect, Urban Development Authority) Mr. W.L.L. Perera (Chartered Accountant), Dr. Rohana Luxman Piyadasa (Mass Media, University of Kelaniya) and Prof. Jayasiri Lankage (Library Science, University of Kelaniya). The resource persons emphasised the fact that students who did not gain entry to the University should not lose hope. There were many other jobs which were equally rewarding and as useful to the nation as the traditional jobs in medicine, engineering and other academic disciplines.
